Thought for the Week

Ah! The parables! Enigmatic entities whose meaning is not immediately clear, Spirit filled seeds of creation, brimming with promise of life and vitality. Some seem simplistic, others baffling, vet others tiresome. The shorter they are, the more meaningful they seem to be. The longer ones invite unfortunate critical analysis that destrovs purpose of their formulation, the presence of the living God.

Think of The Pearl of Great Price, or the Treasure Hidden in a Field - one-liners that carry a stupendous wealth of Presence. No other words are necessary. One is invited into a liminal space of boundless possibility that is - really, truly, madly - ineffable.

Rowan Williams once referred to Christ as a "riddler", "one who makes us strangers to what we think we know," whose "sharp and enigmatic words ... oblige us to imagine ourselves anew ..."

So, in considering the parable of the Sower, let us not get entangled in the details, but seek the greater truth, the Sower Herself. Forget the careful possibilities for agriculture, husbandry of soil types, farmers negligent otherwise, weeds and what not; Sower in this tale reckless. extravagant, abandoned, indiscriminate. Seed is scattered everywhere.

The late R S Thomas' poem Raptor has in part,

You have made God so small setting him astride a pipette or a retort studying the bubbles, absorbed in an experiment that will come to nothing

I think of him rather as an enormous owl abroad in the shadows

...

I have heard him crooning to himself, so that almost I could believe in angels.

Reading Matthew 13:1-23

¹ That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the Such areat crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. 3 And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. 4 And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. fell Other seeds on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. ⁶ But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. 7 Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. 8 Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. 9 Let anyone with ears listen!" 10 Then the disciples came and asked him, "Why do you speak to them in parables?" 11 He answered, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it has not been given. 12 For to those who have, more will be given, and they will have an

abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. 13 The reason I speak to them parables is that 'seeing they do not perceive, and hearing they do not listen, nor do they understand.' With them indeed is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah that says: 'You will listen, indeed but never understand, and you will indeed look, but never perceive. 15 For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are hard of hearing, and they have shut their eyes; so that they might not look with their eyes, and listen their ears, with understand with their heart and turn— and I would heal them.' 16 But blessed are your eyes, for they see, and your ears, for they hear. 17 Truly I tell you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see, but did not see it, and to hear what you hear, but did not hear it. 18 "Hear then the parable of the



sower. 19 When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. ²⁰ As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; 21 yet such person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away.²² As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. 23 But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in hundredfold, in one case a another sixty, and in another thirty."
