



Sermon Notes Sunday 14th April Desiree Snyman - Luke 24:36b-48

Transition Luke 24:36b-48



While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' And when he

had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

We are with the disciples in a moment of transition: they are being transformed from disciples to apostles.

The word "apostle" originates from the Greek word "apóstolos". It means "one who is sent off." The Strong's Dictionary emphasizes being sent with a special commission or authoritative mission. An apostle is an ambassador. Having been taught by the Christ, the apostle is sent to be Christ. Having learnt from the example of Jesus, the apostle is sent as an example to others. An apostle is sent. A disciple receives.

The word "disciple" also has its roots in the Greek word "mathētés," which means "learner" or "follower." A disciple is one who learns by imitating the example of Jesus. Disciples absorb the teachings of Jesus, sitting at the feet of the Christ.

It is often the space of transition where energy is unstable and overwhelming. In the upper room the disciples are trapped by fear and doubt, which prevents their transition to a new state, apostleship.

Of course, apostles remain learners and disciples, but the next stage of their development relies on them not only learning but teaching too. As we grow,



we transcend but include all that went before. We learnt to crawl before we learnt to walk. However, if necessary, we can still crawl. In learning to walk we transcend and include crawling. So too in our spiritual lives. In being sent as apostles, we transcend and include all that went before for this made us who we are. We will always be learners, disciples, but we transcend and include this in being sent as apostles.

Luke 24 is a precis of the entire themes in the Gospel of Luke. The gospel of Luke is structured as a journey. The transition verse into our lection for today is Luke 24.35: Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread. Notice the phrase "on the road". The journey theme is more than a structure for the Gospel, it is the whole Christian life. To be a Christian is to be "on the way" or "on the road". The first Christians were called people of the way. The lection ends with instructions to begin apostleship in Jerusalem. The journey theme of Luke climaxes in Jerusalem from which the message is sent to all the world.

The theme of learning to see as a gateway to salvation is of paramount importance in the Gospel of Luke. In Luke 4 Jesus announces his mission with a text from Isaiah, except he adds that he is there "to bring sight to the blind". Learning to see is growth in faith. Note that twice in Luke 24 disciples of Jesus fail to recognise the risen Christ. Jesus offers peace and opens their mind to understand the Scriptures. This episode is hopeful for us; in those moments when we cannot recognise Christ's risen presence within us or around us, the eyes of faith can help us see God's reliability in the past, to help us appreciate God's presence in the present.

As Christ offers peace and explains the Scriptures, the disciples become apostles through the transforming of their minds (see Romans 12). Their faith is deepened through the raw material of doubt. Doubt is a great gift that when digested produces the fruit of deeper faith. If you think about it, every stage of your faith journey where you have deepened your trust in God has been initiated through the gift of doubt. Doubt is the energy that launches faith from one level to a deeper level. Of course, fear can trap us in doubt. Some people can hold onto doubt that paralyses them, rather than using doubt as the raw material through which faith is strengthened. I am reminded of the words of author Madeleine L'Engle who was asked, 'Do you believe in God without any doubts?' she replied, 'I believe in God with all my doubts.'"

Notice how in the early verse of Luke 24 and in verse 36 onwards, it is through loving community who exist as the body of Christ that the risen Christ is present. Christian community is the space in which the sacraments vivify faith. Christian community, you and I together, manifest the risen Christ to each other and to God's world. It is through the unity that love brings about within the church, the body of Christ, that the power of the risen Christ is

experienced. Christ is known through his life lived among us. This is why Luke-Acts has such an insistent theme on table-fellowship. We do note a caveat though, Christ is present in so far as he enters his glory, not ours. Too often the church has claimed Christ for its own glory, the result of which is destruction, such as in the crusades. Christ's glory, present in the community gathered around him in his name, is noticed through the fruits of self-sacrificing love.

Each Eucharist ends with the Dismissal. Dismissal is a liturgical word stated in the imperative case. The dismissal is our commission as disciples who become apostles. Having fed on Christ through bread and wine shared, we go to be apostles, food for the world that God loves: Go in peace to love and serve the Lord. In the name of Christ, Alleluia, Alleluia, Amen.

Jesus, good shepherd of the sheep,

¹¹ 'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. ¹² The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. ¹³ The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. ¹⁴ I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, ¹⁵ just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. ¹⁶ I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. ¹⁷ For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. ¹⁸ No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.'
