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#### Luke 24:13-35

18 Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, 14 and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. 15 While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, 16 but their eyes were kept from recognizing him, 17 And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad. 18 Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" 19 He asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, 20 and how our chief priests.


It is a relief to know that the disciples are given the gift of God's presence while behind locked doors, while it is evening and while fear of the Jews is the atmosphere. There is no ordered-ness about their lives; there is no deep manifestation of faith, just darkness, fear and locked doors. Jesus appears within their place of fear and breathes on them the holy spirit and commission them as apostles. This is a far cry from the requirements for ministry outlined in 1 Timothy, 2 Timothy and Titus.

One might be tempted to screen write this - "and the disciples filled with the presence of God became a source of God's presence for others. They live happily ever after as Easter people living in the present God's promised future with confident, faithful lives"... No. The pattern repeats itself.

**Unless I put my hand in his side...** The disciples are again in and upstairs room, the doors are still locked, and there is faith and doubt. Doubt incidentally is often in the same room as faith, the more faith the more doubt. Doubt is not the absence of faith but a process of growing from one stage of faith to another.

I am curious about the transition in the second episode where the disciples have again locked the doors and Jesus appears again in the midst again offering peace. The transition as I see it is this: Thomas doubts, Jesus appears in the midst of that doubt, Jesus offers peace, Thomas touches the wounds and then Thomas says the most powerful thing and Easter person can ever say - a confession of faith - My Lord and my God.

And maybe this is our journey: Working with doubt as the raw material of faith, receiving the peace of Jesus and then touching his wounds our relationship grows. Remember that the wounds are about the story of the cross. Faith doesn't annihilate the pain and suffering. Jesus suffering is transformed, but not transmitted.

#### OPTION 2: Use EFT

(<u>Electronic Funds Transfer</u>) from your bank account direct into our church

account.

simply <u>log into your bank account</u>, and can set up a regular deduction

system, so that a set amount is transferred into our bank account

(2c) indicate the start date

for the first amount, eg Thursday 22<sup>rd</sup> April

(2d) indicate how often you

section, PLEASE enter the word 'Offertory'.

OPTION 3: Drawer a cheque to

post to Alstonville Anglicans, PO Box 451, Alstonville NSW 2477.
